#### Miracle Corner





Simon Strowbridge was born October 2, 1999. His due date was December 28th. Simon was born with an under developed left eye. The doctors described it as a cyst. He had webbed fingers and toes. After CT Scans and MRIs, the doctors found that he had no right kidney and a smooth under developed brain. The doctors searched for a syndrome to categorize him with, but the closest one was Walker-Warburg's lissencephaly. It is the most severe of a group of genetic conditions known as congenital muscular dystrophies, wherein most individuals do not live past the age of 3.

Simon started DLC at 5 months old. He got a full scholarship and received physical, speech, & occupational therapy. His Mom, Laura went to FSCJ while he was at DLC. The Physical Therapist at the time, Marc Pyatt taught Laura some physical therapy to do at home with Simon. "Ms. Pat was his main "teacher". Even when he "graduated" to the next room, she would go steal him back. I still have his Pre-K graduation pictures and tassels." Said Laura.



"I think DLC is awesome. They helped me and Simon so much. We try to give back when we can," Said Laura. Simon was sent to a Pre-K the day he turned 3 years old. He went to Biltmore for a year and a half, and Southside Estates for 2 years. During his last year at Southside Estates, Laura felt as if he was being held back. So, she mainstreamed him. She would take him out of class and let him sit in with a kindergarten class that his step brother was in. The teacher was amazing and Simon got to know the kids. He blossomed. His only difficulties were when he would read instead of pay attention to what was going on in the class. In 3<sup>rd</sup> grade he had to take the FCAT. He ended up making a 5 in Math and a 4 in English.

Laura found out about the Florida School for the Deaf and the Blind in St. Augustine. They gave him tests. Simon liked calling them the "What You Know Test". They enrolled him in 5<sup>th</sup> grade. The whole first week of school, they gave him different tests. Laura got a call from his teacher that first Thursday. She said that Simon was reading at an 8<sup>th</sup> grade level and doing math at a 7<sup>th</sup> grade level. She

recommended that we skip him up a grade. Laura was very nervous because 6<sup>th</sup> grade they switch classrooms. What if he got lost? It's his first year in a new school and he's just learning sign language. We tried it out. He did get lost the first 2 days, but he became friends with a profoundly deaf boy, who turned out to be his best friend.

Simon is now 15 years old and going into the 11<sup>th</sup> grade and is the youngest student in his grade. He has a cumulative GPA of a 2.87. He is the only student in his grade to pass the 10<sup>th</sup> grade Florida Standard Aptitude Test (FSA). He will be duel enrolled next year. Meaning he will be taking college classes at First Coast Technical College. He wants to become a computer animator. Simon has also been a huge help this summer at DLC volunteering in the classrooms wherever he is needed. He is a joy to be around, and lights up the room wherever he goes. **Great job Simon! We are so proud of you!** 



## Notes from Nurse Mina 5 Fun Tips to Keep Hydrated this Summer!

Since water is so important, you might wonder if your children are drinking enough. There is no magic amount of water that kids need to drink every day. Usually, kids like to drink something with meals and should definitely drink when they are thirsty. But when it's warm out or they're exercising, they'll need more. Those who participate in sports or strenuous activities should drink some extra fluid before the activity begins. They should also drink at regular intervals (every 20 to 30 minutes) during the course of the activity and after it ends.

Five fun ways to make water more appealing to your children

- 1. Use ice cube trays that make fun shapes and use those ice cubes in your child's water
- 2. Float slices of fruit (such as lemons or limes) in a pitcher of water
- 3. Take your child to pick out a new, special cup
- 4. Keep small bottles of water (the kind with the flip-top) in the fridge so that kids can easily grab it
- 5. Set a good example and drink water yourself!
